It was a great privilege to be asked to attend The **Extraordinary General World Assembly of the** Salesian Family and Salesian Past Pupils in Turin this October. I was the Rep of the Salesian Family in Ireland for The Assembly which ran from 2nd October to the 6th October 2024 in Valdocco, Turin.

On day two, there was a discussion around the theme of Synodality 'Journeying Together' as a Salesian Organisation of Past Pupils and the Salesian Family. The highlight for me personally was attending mass in the Basilica of Maria Ausiliatrice and seeing the exact replica of the mural painting of Mary Help of Christians behind the altar, identical to our church in Copsewood.
